along the way.





The Santa Fe Reporter featured the Guild's work in January. *Fire and Ice:*Forest management group takes advantage of winter storm to burn

hazardous fuels and train private landowners in mitigation techniques.

What does a "resilient" forest look like in California's Sierra Nevada? A lot fewer trees than we're used to. "Most people would be surprised to see what these forests once looked like when frequent surface fires kept them at very low densities. But taking out smaller trees and leaving trees able to get through fire and drought leaves a pretty impressive forest. It does mean creating very open conditions with little inter-tree competition. But there's a lot of historical data that supports this." - Dr. Malcom North. Read more in Operational resilience in western US frequent-fire forests.

Interacting global change drivers suppress a foundation tree species.

Climate change can worsen impact of invasive plants - an example from longleaf pine. Climate change intensifies stressors like drought or wildfires and make an ecosystem more vulnerable to invasive plants. The combination of drought and invasive cogongrass, which made fires burn hotter, negatively impacted longleaf pine.
