Publications and Research

Hotspots of pest-induced US urban tree death, 2020-2050 describes how over the next 30 years, 1.4 million street trees will be killed by invasive insects, costing over 900 million dollars to replace.

Effectiveness of fuel treatments at the landscape scale: State of understanding and key research gaps. This new systematic review of 127 studies confirms with empirical evidence that fuel treatments reduced negative outcomes of wildfire and can promote beneficial wildfire outcomes.

Forest water use is increasingly decoupled from water availability even during severe drought. Climate warming reduces water from mountain forests. Warming reduces downslope water availability, amplifying vulnerability of runoff, the health of downslope vegetation, and aquatic biodiversity.

Warming weakens the night-time barrier to global fire. Continued night-time warming resulting in hotter, drier nights owing to anthropogenic climate change will promote more intense, longer-lasting and larger fires.
