Job title: FSYC Crew Member

Location: Mountainair, Pueblo of Jemez, Espanola, NM

Status: Seasonal, full-time

Who We Are

The Forest Stewards Guild, a national organization of foresters and allied natural resource professionals, is dedicated to practicing and promoting responsible forestry as a means of sustaining the integrity of forest ecosystems and the human communities dependent upon them. The Forest Stewards Youth Corps (FSYC) started 26 years ago in 1998 to engage local youth in sustainable forestry practice to create future forest stewards. This program expanded in 2018 to include the Fall Fire and Fuels program, a steppingstone into a full-time fire career. Three crews of five people are hired each fall, receive all fire qualifications, and work alongside Forest Service and Natural Resource Department staff in doing various natural resource management projects, in addition to performing prescribed burns, weather permitting. The FSYC program's goal is to provide training, education, and experience to further the career and interest of youth and young adults to receive employment opportunities and develop professionally.

Position Description

Duties for the Crew Members include:

- Work with a crew of four people in natural resource management projects such as fencing, trail work, prescribed fire preparation, fire line creation, etc.
- Participate in prescribed burns across New Mexico, weather permitting.
- Camp and work during rough weather conditions.
- Problem solve and work collaboratively with fellow crewmembers to ensure crew tasks are completed.
- Work safely as part of team.

Minimum Qualifications:

- Comply with Forest Service and FSYC rules and policies
- No previous wildland fire fighting experience is required
- Physically fit and able to lift 75lbs, work long days in the field (14 hours) and walk with heavy loads on steep and uneven terrain.
- Wildland firefighter Certification within one week of the start of the program (training provided).
- Be prepared to camp at Cottonwood Gulch Basecamp during the mandatory training in week one and two of the program. Food is provided.
- Wildland fire-fighting certifications including L-180, S-212, S-190, S-130, I-100, and I-700.
- Red card upon the completion of the pack test.
- First Aid and CPR certification
- Must be able to pass an arduous pack test. Walk 3 miles with 45 lbs in 45 minutes.

Compensation

- \$17/hour
- Holiday pay, sick leave, and cultural leave pay.
- Free Housing available in Mountainair.

The Guild provides an open, transparent, and just organization and workplace. We strive for clear, open, and kind communication and are committed to recruiting, hiring, mentoring, and supporting staff from underrepresented communities.
